



AUGUST - Still in the suitcase.




A Welcome Hand


PEOPLE YOU SHOULD KNOW

In an effort to know more about the lives of the saints in this part of the Lord's vineyard, we will begin a series of articles in which members of our Oklahoma City Second Ward will be honored.

We have chosen to start off with a couple who are always willing and make the time to love and help their fellowmen.

Max Tompkins, the youngest of two brothers, was born on March 14, 1911 to Omer Tompkins and Nellie Guffey in Taft, California. His family moved to Kansas where he attended high school. In 1930 after graduating, he continued his education at the local Junior College. He was an avid tennis player, bringing eight medals to the State of Kansas. Max was an great sportsman. And always looking for adventure, he hitch hiked across the country. Later he transferred to the University of Alabama where one of his classmates was the legendary Bear Bryant. He graduated from the College of Emporia in 1937 with a degree in Education. Max taught in Kansas for a while, then he preceded to move to California to continue his career as a High School teacher, and coached a variety of sports such as basketball, softball, and football; in his own words "you name it".

Up to this point he had been attending the Methodist Church, but as the Lord touches the lives of those who are ready to listen his Word, he was introduced to the Church by the school's superintendent and was baptized in 1969 in Independence California. The Branch he first attended had



about thirty members.

His interests include reading, fishing, and of course being the neighborhood grandpa, he loves children and recently became a great-grandfather. Max also has written about three hundred pages of his own life history.

Max met Claudia in Norman at a Stake Conference, he said "it was love at first sight" and they both felt the Lord sent them for each other.

Sister Tompkins was the second child of four (a brother and two sisters) to Charlie Burris and Ruth Handwork, born in McKamie Arkansas on the eighteenth of June, 1927.

She moved to California with her family, and to her delight met the Church through her landlord and his wife, who were serving as Stake Missionaries (Max and Claudia both are currently serving as such). Sister Tompkins used to attend the Nazarene Church. She became a member of the Church in 1954 in Woodland, California. Both of her children are also members.

Sister Tompkins has a delightful smile that

warms the soul, she loves people and says her family and best friends are in our Ward. She has many talents, one of them being an excellent gardener, she takes pride in her beautiful yard and during the summer spends a lot of time outdoors, she says "flowers are one of God's gifts to us". She takes care of herself by exercising on her treadmill everyday. In 1984 she retired from Bell Telephone Company, were she worked for twenty eight years. Sister Tompkins continues to work with her genealogy. She loves to serve our Savior, reading, crafts, collects camels and truly loves and enjoys people. As a young woman she took modeling and really enjoyed it, she says even now she still uses a lot of the things she learned.

When Claudia met Max, she was in the process of moving to Utah, her plans changed a "little" she did not go alone....instead they both left

Oklahoma. They married in the Salt Lake Temple in 1978, and for the next two years worked at the Provo, SLC, Manti, Ogden and Jordan River Temples. Brother Tompkins told us he



had made up his mind that his bride was to be a "mormon girl or no marriage for him". Later they took a seventeen day honeymoon trip to Mexico.

Between them, they have four children and twelve grandchildren of whom they are very proud of.

They have both served in many capacities in the Church brother Tompkins has served as Elders Quorum President, Sunday School Superintendent and teacher, Primary teacher, High Priest leader, Financial clerk, served a eighteen months mission at the Bishop Store House and many more.
