As Sisters in the gospel we have a big responsibility to keep our testimonies strong that we may be able to withstand


all the challenges put upon us.

PEOPLE YOU SHOULD KNOW

Gerald Sylvester Lindsey was born in Blanchard, Oklahoma on September 25, 1924. The second child of Oscar Joseph Lindsey and Eula Cordella Woodson. He was baptized into the Church at the age of eight years old in a Lake by the travelling missionaries. Brother Lindsey is a third generation LDS on the Lindsey side and fourth generation on his Grandmother Huggins side.

He started school in a country school south of Elk City, on his first day he got his hands paddled for chewing gum in class. He was a mischievous

child and adventures taught him a few unforgettable lessons. When he was six years old brother Lindsey's father pulling wagon with a 500lb hog and barrels of water in it with his model

Ford. His Father told him he could not go with him to the field where the hog was to be butched. So he hid on the



running board opposite to the driver, his uncle was holding on to the wagon and letting it pull him along, Brother Lindsey thought that was fun, so he stepped off of the running board while it was moving and fell under the wagon wheels. The front wheels ran over his back. The back wheels were about to run over his head,

but his uncle pulled the wagon sideways causing the back wheel to run over his back also, saving his life.

In 1943 he joined the Marine Corps during the Second World War. He served in the South Pacific and China.

He worked as a general contractor, was a wall dry contractor

and owned a cabinet shop. With this talent he had the opportunity to build several LDS chapels, including our

building.

In 1934 his family moved to Oklahoma City, the church was meeting in the old court house, from there it moved to 23rd and S. Robinson over a bar. After a while they moved to the Capitol Hill funeral home and used their chapel for the meetings. The church kept on growing and so it kept moving locations, after the funeral home they moved to an auditorium on 6th and N. Robinson, from there moved to the YWCA. Finally they built an LDS chapel which brother Lindsey helped build at 44th and N. Lee.

Brother Lindsey has served as Scout Master, Stake missionary and mission president, he had thirty four baptisms while serving in this capacity. Stake Seventies Leader, Stake Sunday School Presidency. Second counselor in the Bishopric, High counselor twice, Bishop and currently he is serving as our Stake Patriarch.


He loves sports and is a OU fan, he reads constantly. Brother Lindsey loves the Lord and has a strong testimony of the church.

On November 6, 1925 John Edgar Overcast and Annie May Martin were blessed with their first child Viola May, while living at a coal mine camp in Hartshorme, Oklahoma. Sister Lindsey has two brothers and two sisters (one of her brothers is deceased). She is twenty years older than her younger brother.

When she started kindergarten her Mother would take her to school, but Viola would beat her back home, she said: "Eventually Mother got tired of this game, so I don't even think I finished kindergarten." Her family was living in Kiowa, OK when she entered the first grade. Once, in Wesley Okla., she was cutting across a pasture to get to school faster, and she sure did with a bull running behind her. When she was six, her best friend spent the night at her

house, her friend woke up with the measles and so did her brothers and the whole town, but not Viola. Eventually she did get them, and it was a terribly case that almost claimed her life.

Her favorite thing to do was to play with paper dolls, on one occassion her Mother had made her a pretty dress with 6 shiny buttons on the front. The boys wanting the buttons for their planes, would trade a button for paper dolls. Gerald said she got some store bought paper dolls for her daughters and since they wouldn't play with them, one day he went into the room to see what his wife



was doing, and found her on the floor

playing with paper dolls.

Sister Lindsey lived in Houston, Texas while attending Jr. High and High School. Later her family moved back to Oklahoma City. She worked for Douglas Plant until the war was over, then worked for the Telephone Company and in the office of a clothing store.

While working for the Clothing

Store she met Gerald. Viola's friend showed a picture of her to Gerald and fixed them up with a blind date to be

taken place on Friday the 13th. Brother Lindsey said thought she beautiful." Viola said "..sure, I had long pretty hair, and wore high heels." Sister Lindsey said she was not very impressed with him, but she knew he was going to call again the next day...he didn't, not until Sunday. From then on they saw each other everyday

and were engaged three months later. Gerald asked her if she loved him in chinese...she didn't answered until he told her of his love for her first. They got married on March 21, 1947, six months after they met. The ceremony presided by President Cullimore, and have been happily married for 43 years.

After Viola's Mother passed away, the couple moved in with her Father to take care of her younger brother and sisters.

It took twelve years for Sister Lindsey to get baptized, she would go for visits but did not get serious about the church, until one day she just asked Gerald if he was ready to go to Church he answered: "If you are ready to stop drinking coffee, we will go." Next morning she had a cup of hot chocolate, went to church and three Sundays later was baptized by President Cullimore. the following Sunday after her baptism she received three callings.

Brother and Sister Lindsey have two daughters Marti Elizabeth (Carlson) and Katheryne Elaine (Soles). They have four grandchildren two girls and two boys. Their grandchildren are very important to them, and all they want is for these choice spirits to grow up to be

righteous.

When Marti was seventeen months, sister Lindsey received a call from the Doctor to see if they would like



to adopt a little girl, she said yes knowing her husband would love to and went ahead with it. She went to get brother Lindsey from his

work to go sign the papers and told him then "Congratulations, you are a new Father" "How nice" was the response and so they left to get their daughter. Sister Lindsey has had five miscarriages and two children that only lived for a short time. She feels that Kathy had chosen them as her family and just had to get to her through someone else. Viola says "..the same night, I held Kathy in my arms all night long and cried with joy, just as I did when Marti was born."

When Fourth Ward broke off from Second Ward she was the Relief Society President for two years, and has served in the Stake in different callings. Sister Lindsey was the Merrie Miss teacher for eight years, Primary Secretary for two years, Sunday School teacher one year, four years in the MIA, and worked in the extraction propgram for six years. She has always tried to do her very best with any calling. Currently she is serving as the magazine representative in our ward.

Sister Lindsey is learning how to play the piano, loves to draw plans for houses, and she says "I am amazed of how I can make everything fit together, I wish I could have been an architect."

Brother and Sister Lindsey walk together every day, and really enjoy each others company. §


..as I thought about this man, tears swelled up in my eyes and I couldn't talk. The way that man looked at me I will never forget.


dumpster.



2. Vi la imcomparable belleza de la puerta por la cual entraran los herederos de ese reino, que era semejante a llamas circundantes de fuego.


3. Tambien el refulgente trono de Dios, sobre el cual se hallaban
